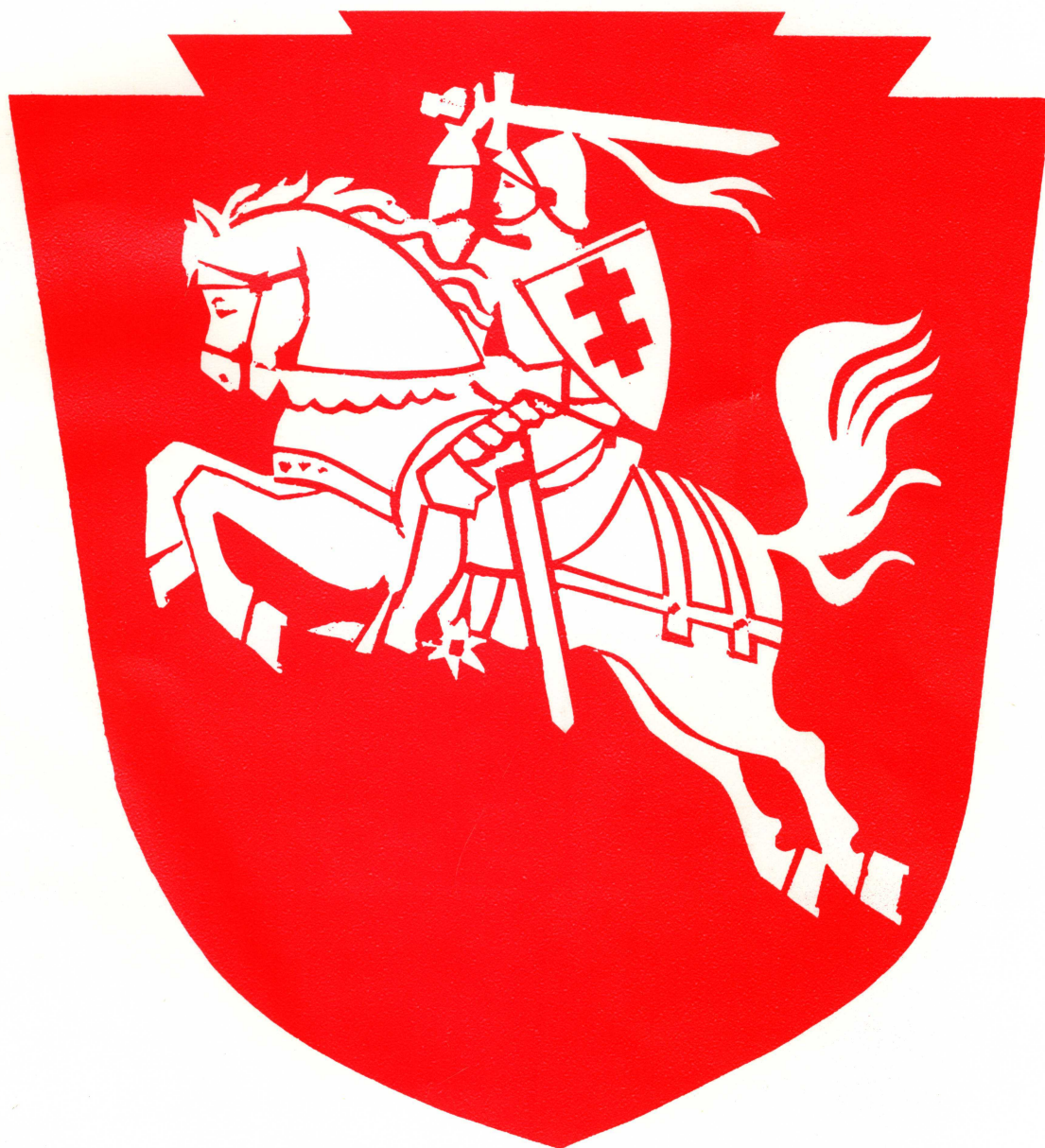

U.S. POSTAL SERVICE ISSUES NEW, LOWER,  
"HUMANITARIAN" AIRLIFT RATE TO LITHUANIA

The U.S. Postal Service, according to a recent postal announcement, from November 1, 1991 through March 31, 1992, will provide airlift service for parcels for delivery to Lithuania at a reduced, "humanitarian" rate.

Official instructions from the U.S.P.S. to all field installations, dated October 31, say that they are offering this service to help persons in the United States send humanitarian aid to individuals and families in Lithuania through a means that is faster than regular surface mail, at a cost lower than airmail service.

Normally, senders to Lithuania have only two options: 1) Surface mail, taking an average of two months, and 2) Airmail, which usually takes ten days. The new service offers a delivery of packages up to 22 pounds in two to three weeks at rates about 50% the cost of airmail.

A ten-pound package sent surface mail to Lithuania costs \$23.35. The airmail rate would be \$70.30, while the new humanitarian airlift rate costs only \$33.35.

Here are the conditions:

- 1) Parcels must be addressed to individuals or families, and must show the sender's return address.
- 2) The parcel must bear a bold, red, endorsement placed to the left of the address stating, "HUMANITARIAN AIRLIFT".
- 3) Postal insurance and other special services are not available in conjunction with this rate.
- 4) The official rate is the surface rate plus an airlift surcharge of \$1 per pound. Maximum weight is 22 pounds.
- 5) Packages sent to Lithuania must show the destination country written in English, and must not be addressed "via" another country.
- 6) Prohibitions and restrictions on parcel contents to the (former) U.S.S.R. no longer apply, and Lithuania has not (as of the time of issuance of these regulations) issued a list of prohibited or restricted entry items. Mailers assume responsibility for the items they send.

An additional important note: the U.S.P.S., at the same time the airlift rate was announced, issued new procedures and routing for mail to Lithuania that greatly lessens the possibility that senders' packages and other mail will be tampered with by Russian handlers:

1) Airmail (including packages sent at the new airlift rate), previously routed to Moscow, is either being flown directly to Vilnius, or routed to a Western European transfer point such as Helsinki or Copenhagen. If flight schedules force a transfer via Moscow, only "ramp transfers" will occur - no sorting will be done in Moscow.

2) Surface mail addressed to Lithuania now is presorted in the U.S., and shipped in marked containers via Helsinki directly to the appropriate country.

This U.S.P.S. announcement creates an opportunity for collectors with connections in Lithuania to get parcel wrappers with the new temporary rate. No special stamps are to be issued.

#### KAUNAS COLORED ISSUE OF 1920 - 1921 PERFORATIONS

In 1920 and 1921 four different types of stamps, the design taken from one done by Kazys Simonis and Tadas Daugirdas for the lower values of the Berlin issues, were lithographically printed at the Margolinas Printing establishment in Kaunas.

On that much, all the sources agree. But when I recently began creating the design for an album page on which to mount the basic issues and a number of the varieties as well, I immediately ran into trouble. There is disagreement between Michel and Postage Stamps of Lithuania on the perforation measurement of even the basic types. When I checked the brand new edition of the Stanley Gibbons "Russia"-area catalog, and the 1948-49 Baltic Catalog, I found only more questions. The chart (see page 9086) is a necessary part of the following discussion.

The chief problem is that the 1978 "Postage Stamps of Lithuania" "PSL" catalog apparently incorrectly states the issue's basic perforation size: it is given as 11 1/4, while 1992 Scott, 1990-91 Michel, 1991 Stanley Gibbons, 1948-49 Baltic - and my own Linn's Multi-Gauge, which easily allows for measurement of differences of

less than 1/4, on my own examples of these stamps, clearly show the perforation to be 11 1/2, not 11 1/4.

Let me be clear on this - I have not rounded off. The measurement is not closer to 11 1/4 than it is to 11 1/2. Unless I have unique perforation varieties, and every other catalog for the past 40 years has been wrong, a mistake was made in the measurement of the most common perforation type of the Kaunas Colored Issue.

That is not the only problem, however. Stanley Gibbons gives a variant perforation measurement on the 15sk Lilac, unwatermarked (Scott #93), as 11. That is close to the PSL's unique 10 3/4 variant, but what do you make of the fact that Michel follows the lead of the Baltic catalog and assigns numbers to a 10 1/2 x 11 variant, and a 14 1/2 variant? The PSL editors did not include varieties they did not see, or could not verify. This does not mean that those two varieties do not exist, but perhaps it is time to ask members, and those with access to newly available Lithuanian government archives, to settle these questions, and the ones that follow, once and for all.

As regards Scott #94, the unwatermarked 20sk Dull Blue, my measurements and all but one catalog, indicate that the only perforation type is 11 1/2. The PSL catalog again goes it alone and claims that the measurement is 11 1/4.

With Scott #95, 20sk Dull Blue, watermarked horizontal and vertical honeycomb, the catalogs again diverge on the variants. The basic size is again 11 1/2 in all, including my own measurements, except for the PSL catalog, which sticks with 11 1/4. Stanley Gibbons claims a variant at 11, and the PSL catalog again claims a 10 3/4.

The 40sk Light Brown, watermarked horizontal honeycomb, Scott #96, ends the group with a flourish: the basic measurement is again 11 1/2 everywhere but in the PSL catalog, where it is 11 1/4. The variants begin with a Stanley Gibbons at 11, then comes the PSL's 10 3/4, and Scott finally lists a unique 10 1/2 x 11 1/2 no one else thinks exists. Michel and the Baltic catalog describe a 10 1/2 x 11 variant. Not to be outdone, the PSL catalog closes with a unique unwatermarked variant.

Perhaps this issue should be known as the Kaunas Confused Issue. Perforation measurements are not normally subjectively interpreted details. I do not have, in my modest collection, any of these issues with a perforation other than, carefully measured, exactly, 11 1/2. There appears to have been a variant at around 11. Is it possible that there were private, unofficial perforations of imperforate sheets that would account for the additional variants?

Designed by K. Zove. Perf. 13 1/4, gummed white paper. Issued to mark the 50th anniversary of tragic events in Lithuania. Printed offset, in sheets of 50, at Wertpapierdruckerei, Germany. No printed notations on selvage of full sheet.

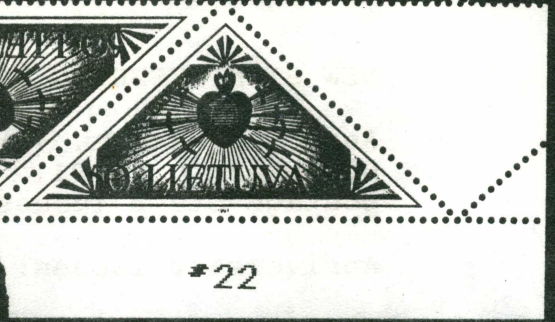

C12: June 14, 1991

"1941 June 14 1991"

Registered mail envelope, "R" rectangle in black. Cachet: Yellow candles illuminating dark gray railroad tracks, commemorating the beginning of mass deportations 50 years ago. Printed stamp is a "70" denominated Vytis design (c), in turquoise, the Vytis and "Lietuva" white, the denomination and "1991" in black. Designed by M. Jasilionyte. Cost: 80 Kap. Printed by Spindulys. Quantity: 1,000,000.

C13: June 22, 1991

"Lithuania 1941 June 1991"

Cachet: Stylized Dove, in white, yellow and black, flying over light purple horizon. Type in black and white. Printed stamp is a "20" denominated Vytis design (c), in light purple, the Vytis and "Lietuva" white, the denomination and 1991 in black. Designed by R. and V. Rutkauskas. Cost: 30 Kap. Printed by Spindulys.

C14: July 27, 1991

"IV World Lithuanian Sport Games Lithuania - 1991"

Registered mail envelope, "R" rectangle in yellow. Cachet: Yellow disc, stylized black Gediminas pillars and two rings within, notation in black type encircling pillard, within disc. Printed stamp is "70 + 25," in green and black, following design of stamp #25 (c) except for price, which is 50 + 25 on the original design. Designer is V. Lisaitis. Cost: 105 Kap. Printed by Spindulys. Quantity: 1,000,000.

C15: August 3, 1991 (According to Pasto Zenklas. Earliest usage I have is August 4.)

"IV World Lithuanian Sport Games Lithuania - 1991"

Cachet: Green basketball and soccer players, with type encircling them in black. Printed stamp is "30 + 10," a world map in green and yellow, with Gediminas pillars, following the design of stamp #24 (n) (whose denomination was "20"). Designer is V. Lisaitis. Cost: 50 Kap. Printed by Spindulys. Quantity: 1,000,000.

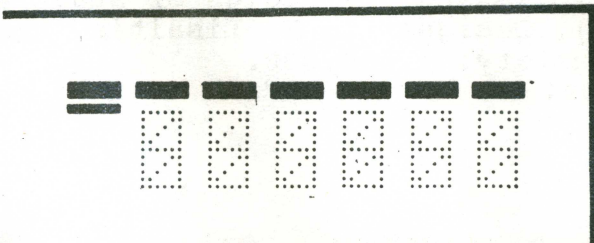
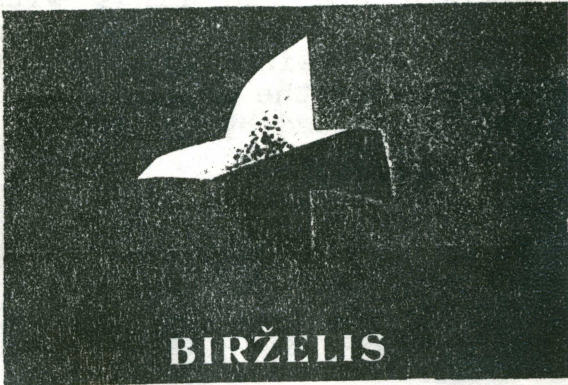

## A NEW ISSUES PRICE COMPARISON, NOVEMBER 1991

Kent Research's press releases, as published in Linn's, claim they are the official wholesale outlet for the new stamps of Lithuania and that they offer the stamps at "face" value. While Kent Research's prices are cheaper when you buy 10 copies of a stamp from them (the reduction may be 30% or so), I wonder what "face" they are referring to when at 40 Rubles to a dollar the face value (40 Rubles is an average) of issues # 1-34 including the sheetlets is \$.665 US. Also, as you will note from the prices on the chart on page 9098, there are a number of mail order firms that offer issues to individual collectors at prices lower than Kent's "wholesale" prices.

The addresses of the five stamp sellers and the lists I used for my comparison are as follows:

Audras Stamps (Leo Markauskas), P.O. Box 557, Dee Why, 2099 Australia (List #2) Prices in his list, in Australian Dollars, have been converted to US Dollars at .785 (and rounded upwards).

Blanks in the chart indicate no price listed.

(Ed. Note - The markup on modern Lithuanian stamps selling in the West over and above the face value of the stamps is something of concern to me. I do not mean to say and am not saying that anyone who buys the country complete for \$30.00 is a sucker (it is only \$30.00 and not \$30,000) or that anyone who sells a set for \$1.00 or \$10.00 is a crook, but especially when you buy, it is better to be knowledgeable. None of the new regular issue stamps are rarities, especially when one compares the rarity of the modern material to that of any 1918-1940 issue. This Bulletin is mailed out with stamps that are 20-50 years old yet are not worth more than face value. Every Lithuanian stamp from 1-34 has been offered to me in full sheets including the so called rare ones and I know more than one collector who has every stamp issued to date in full sheets. New collectors should remember mint stamps for many issues from the 1930's (with printings of 1,000,000+ where because few people collected only hundreds exist today) sell today for only several dollars each. Notwithstanding the relative difficulties our ordinary fellow collectors in Lithuania have in getting copies of their latest issue at the post office (about which we will have more in the next issue) tens of thousands of copies of each stamp exist mint. Buy the new stamps because you want copies of them, and because you are not concerned with resale, and you will be fine.)
